


## Annual Report 2017-2018





# Dear Friends,

Planning and piloting a new student reengagement center for out-of-school and disengaged youth began in 2010 and 2011. Since then, the D2 Center has served over 700 young people, including 269 high school graduates. These students had either dropped out of school or were headed in that direction and were facing a broad range of barriers, such as: parenting and childcare, lack of transportation and family support, juvenile or criminal justice involvement, substance abuse, and behavioral health issues.

The D2 Center works directly with students and families, school staff members, and many youth-serving organizations in the community to address the problems of high-risk youth. Answering this challenge lies at the core of who we are as a community because of the powerful economic, social, and moral consequences of not addressing the issue.

During the past year, the D2 Center has reached new heights:

- Three hundred students served with nearly two hundred still fully active in the program;
- Seventy-five graduates the highest number of graduates since we opened;
- Full implementation and expansion of a new partnership with the Omaha Public Schools;
- Through the partnership, outreach to nearly 250 students who had withdrawn from school but were eligible to re-enroll;
- Nearly one hundred students served with one-on-one assistance with postsecondary planning.

The D2 Center is funded by grants from The Sherwood Foundation, the Weitz Family Foundation, the City of Omaha, the United Way of the Midlands, and by individual contributions through programs such as Omaha Gives! sponsored by the Omaha Community Foundation. We thank you for your support.



# How Students Connect With D2 Center



## New in 2017-18

#### Numbers of Youth Served, Graduates, and Outreach:

All-time highs in each category include:

- 323 total students served
- 175 new students
- 75 students graduated from high school
- 242 outreach attempts to withdrawn students (this figure almost doubled)

### D2 Center/OPS Reengagement Project:

- So far, 13 students from the 2017-18 project and 22 from the 2016-17 project have graduated. Many other students in these groups could still graduate in the months ahead.
- 22 students were recruited into the D2 Center program.
- 250-300 students is the outreach goal for the 2018-19 school year.

#### **Program Expansion:**

In order to provide quality services to a larger population of students, the D2 Center added the following staff members:

- Bette Norton Ball, part-time Career Navigator, who joined the D2 Center in the spring of 2018.
- Jesi DeWitt, full-time YAN, was hired in the spring and becomes the seventh YAN on the team.
  Like other YANs, Jesi is also doing outreach to OPS students who have withdrawn from school but are eligible to reenroll.

### Funding Update:


- In June 2018, the D2 Center received great news of securing funding through the United Way of the Midlands Community Investment Grant for 2018-19 and 2019-20.
   Each year \$24,000 will help support the D2 Center YAN program.
- For the past four years, the D2 Center has had funding from the City of Omaha in the amount of \$30,000 to support the YAN program.

#### **Board News:**


- Student graduates Dominique McDaniel and Karina Mejia-Garcia joined this past year.










# Mission

The mission of the D2 Center is to connect out-of-school and disengaged youth ages 15-21 into an educational pathway with other resources and supports needed to earn a high school diploma and prepare for post-secondary opportunities and a career.

The D2 Center is a voluntary program for youth who are currently not in school, are in alternative education programs, or are in a traditional high school and are exhibiting risk factors indicating they may drop out of school or may not graduate on time.
